Friends and Members of the Ester Fire Service Area,

I am pleased to present to you the FY2024 Annual Report for Ester Volunteer Fire Department. The following report is a summary of our activities, accomplishments, recognitions and continued growth. This report covers from July 1st, 2023 to June 30, 2024.

Ester Volunteer Fire Department members responded to 286 total calls in FY24. Our responses included a major airplane crash, wildland fires, residential house fires and multiple severe motor vehicle accidents along the Parks Highway.

This past year we continued training our members in regards to fire, EMS, rescue, leadership and vehicle operation. Our members currently have an outstanding level of qualification in Firefighting and EMS. In addition, we have fully activated our Trail EMS program which gives us the capability to render aid in non-road accessible places such as our extensive trail system.

The Ester Community Association and friends of the Ester Volunteer Fire Department have continued to provide an invaluable back stop to our Department.

I am especially proud of our members response when we conduct an emergency call-back. Last year was a record setting year with an average of 7 members coming in on recall with a high of 17.

I am honored to lead the 27 members of Ester Volunteer Fire Department. The Ester firefighters and medics are a motivated, loyal group that is proud to serve the Ester and greater Fairbanks community.

On behalf of the Ester Volunteer Fire Department, thank you for your support and for taking the time to review this report.

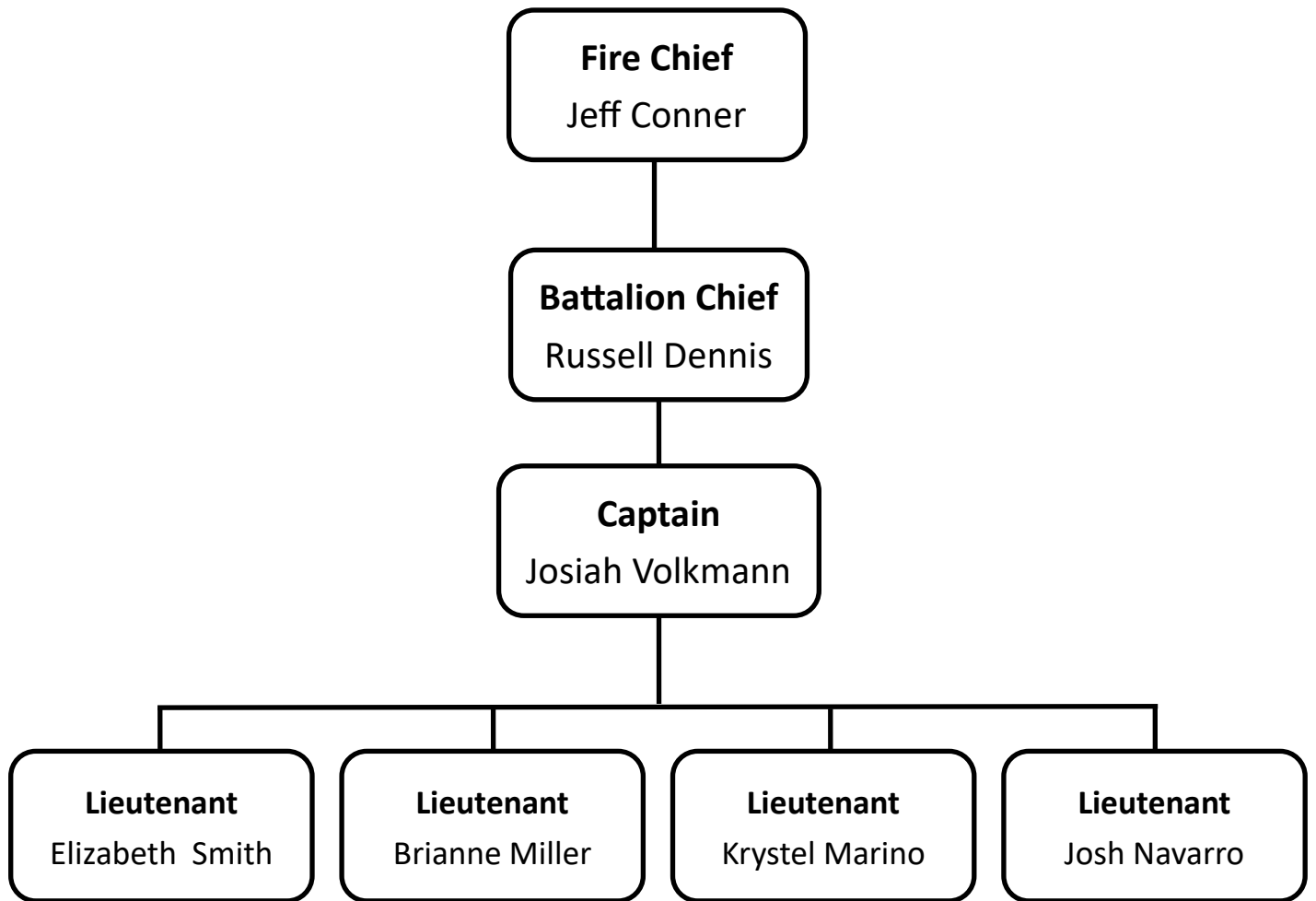

2022 - 2023 Accomplishments

Trail EMS

- Greg Kahoe and Krystel Marino have been appointed as the new Trail EMS program team leaders. They will continue to increase our summer and winter response capabilities to render care to people in off-road emergencies.

Water Supply

- The Oboe Court fire water fill site is in operation with over 10,000 gallons of firefighting water accessible there.

Recruitment & Retention

- We have averaged over 24 volunteer members despite an increased turnover and retirement rate.

Paid Staff

- We currently have 4 Station Duty Officers, including 1 full-time and 3 part-time firefighters. This gives us a deeper bench for our 24/7 in-station response staff. Additionally, we have a fulltime, paid admin.

Community Events

- We hosted a successful Halloween party, open house and community garage sale. We had enthusiastic participation from our members in the Ester 4th of July parade, and we again participated in the JTEL seed saver program with an addition to our station garden in the summer of 2023.

Response Apparatus

- We have placed in service a Polaris RZR UTV, which is a key component of the Trail EMS program.
- Brush 52 has been turned into the FNSB as non-repairable. Brush 51 has been retrofit, largely by Captain Josiah Volkmann, and has taken it's place as our frontline brush truck.
- A new Polaris snowmachine was obtained for Trail EMS winter operations.



2022 - 2023 Staffing & Grants

Grants

Code Blue (completed) - We received funding to purchase a new Polaris snow machine for the Trail EMS program.

Code Blue (completed) - We received funding to purchase a secondary RZR UTV for the Trail EMS program.

Community Assistance Program (completed) - We received \$5,263 to offset the cost of building maintenance (heating and electricity).

Firehouse Subs (completed) - We received \$31,000 to purchase 8 new full bunker sets.

Emergency Responses

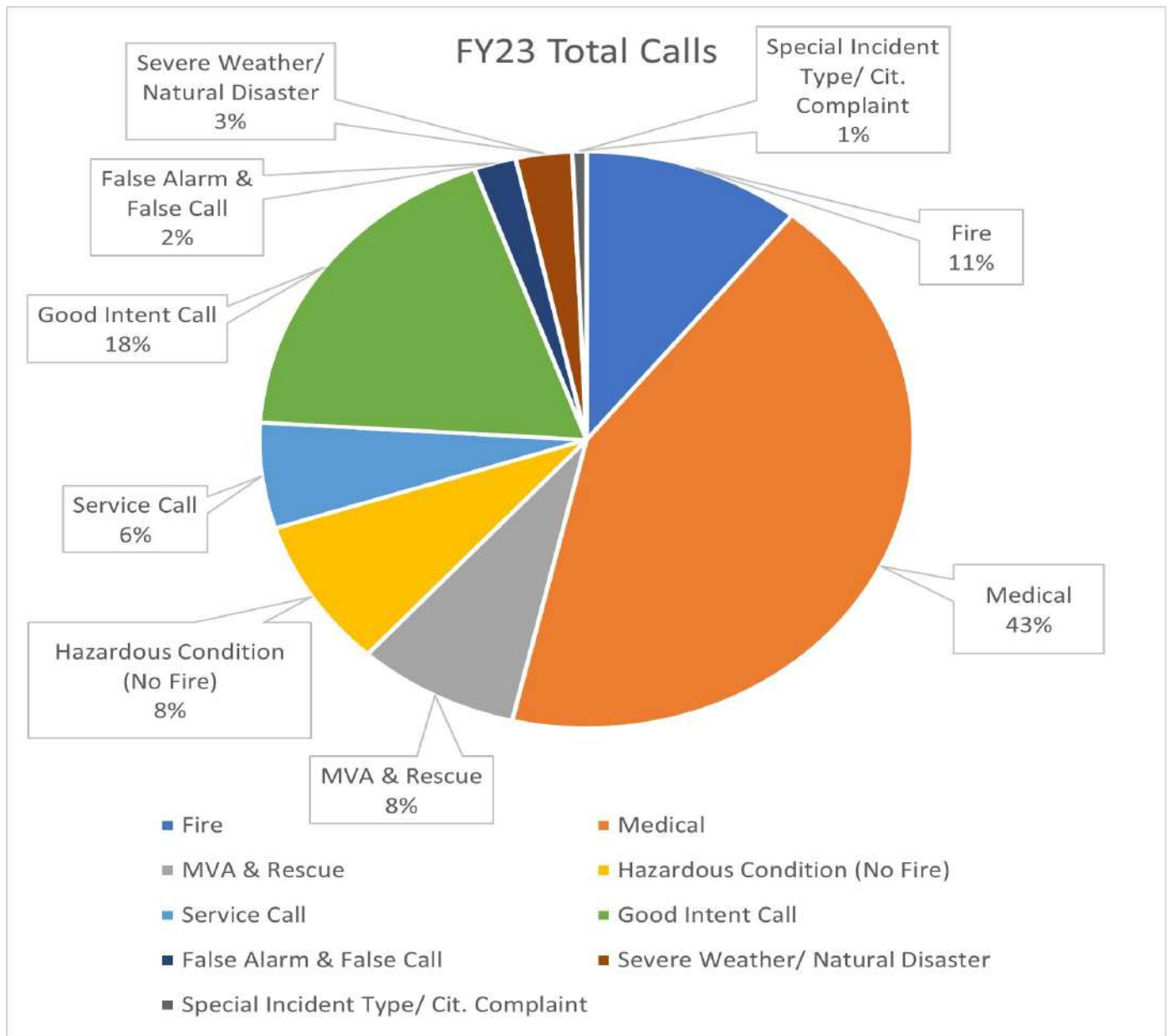
Ester Volunteer Fire Department responded to 287 calls throughout FY23, an increase over last year and an overall record year for us. We believe our calls will continue to trend upwards in the future, as we've seen over the last decade. Of note, medical calls have tripled over the past 5 years.

Ester Volunteer Fire Department fought several residential fires this past year, both in our own district and while responding as mutual aid to our neighboring departments. We also responded to a wildland fire in our district this summer.

Over half of our annual calls were medical, which is fairly typical for our Department. The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic added challenges to these calls as we have continued efforts to keep our own members and the community safe.

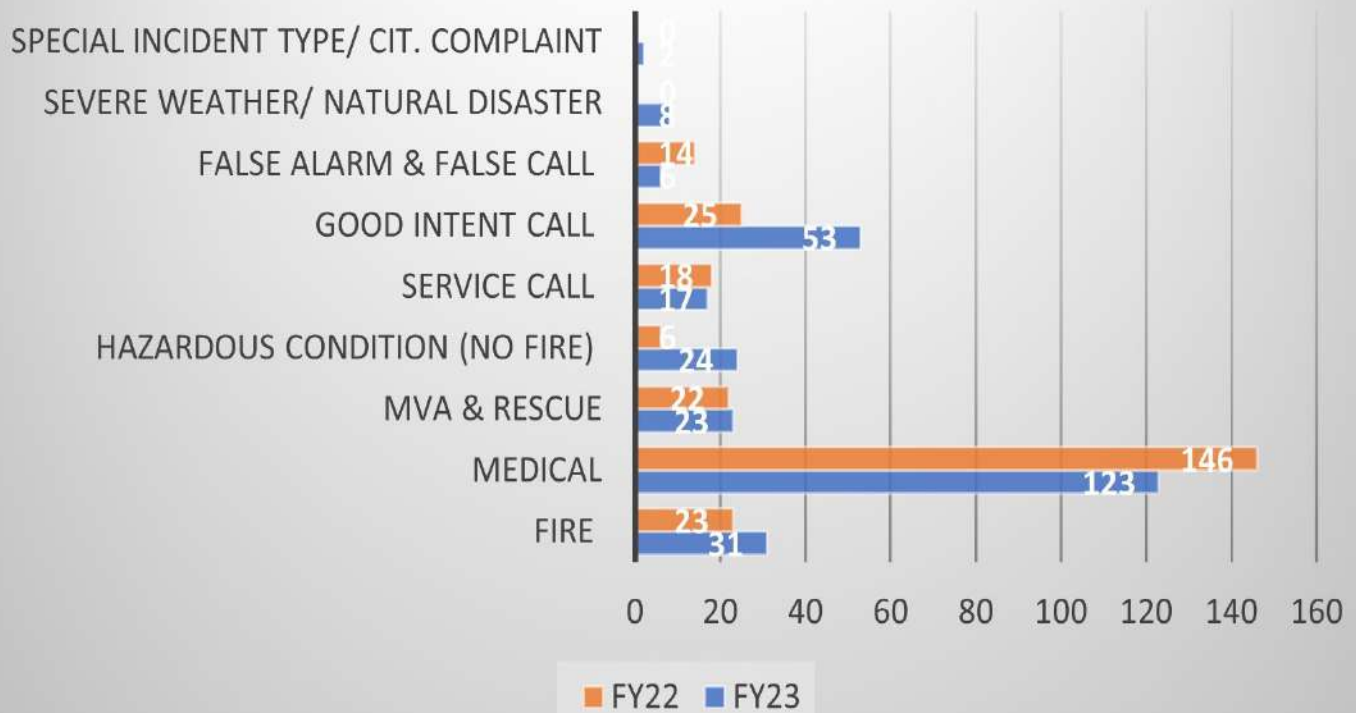
Motor vehicle accidents and vehicle fires continue to be a high-hazard response for us, though low frequency. Our Department responds to accidents on the Parks highway within our own fire district and south of our district to the FNSB boundary at milepost 325. Continuing this year are our off-road EMS response capabilities via the Trail EMS program.



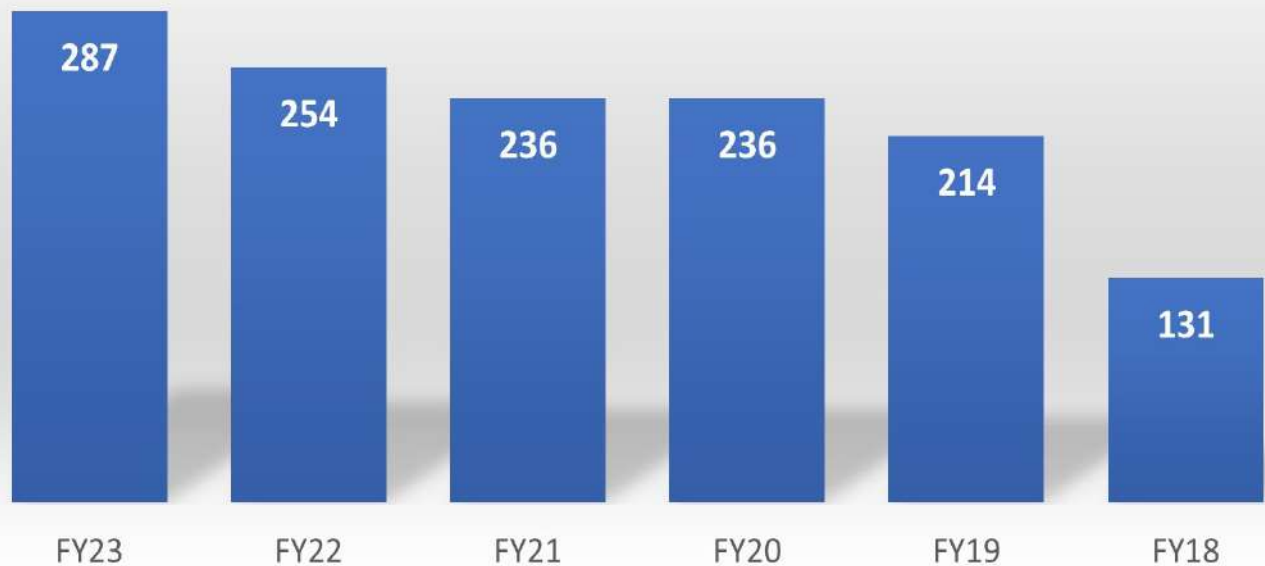

FY23 vs FY24 Call Comparison

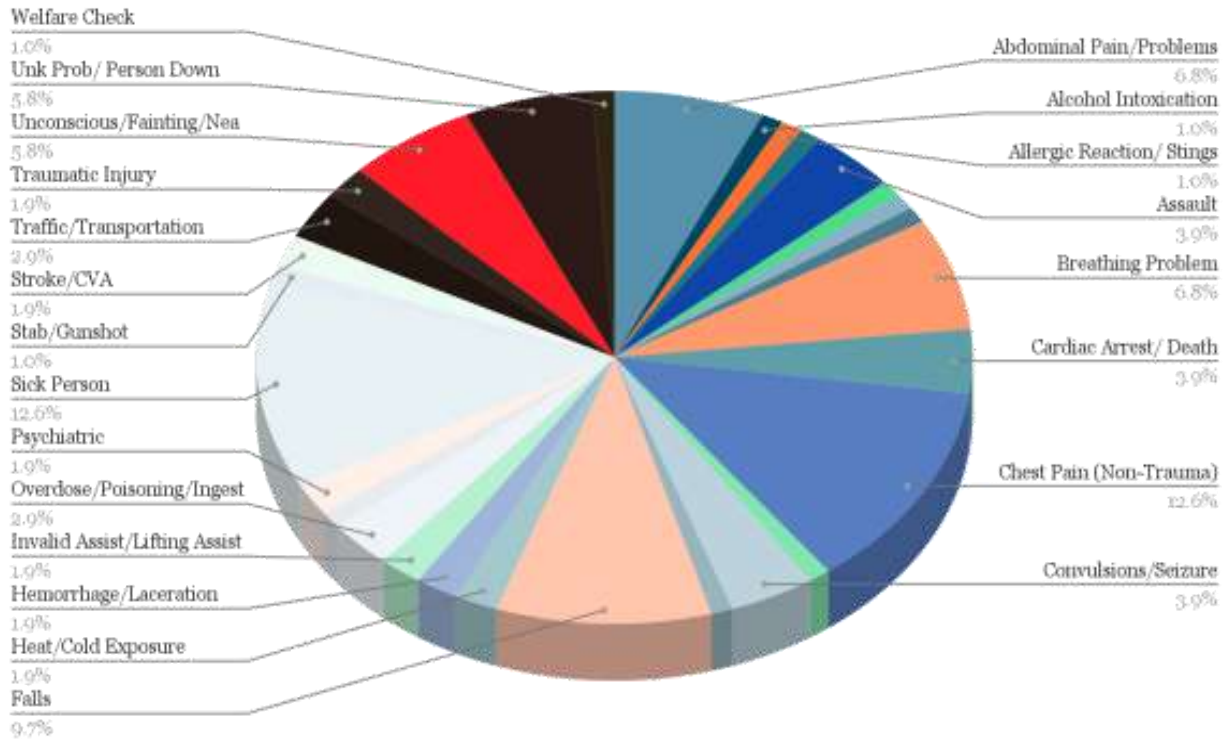


Total Call Volume Comparison

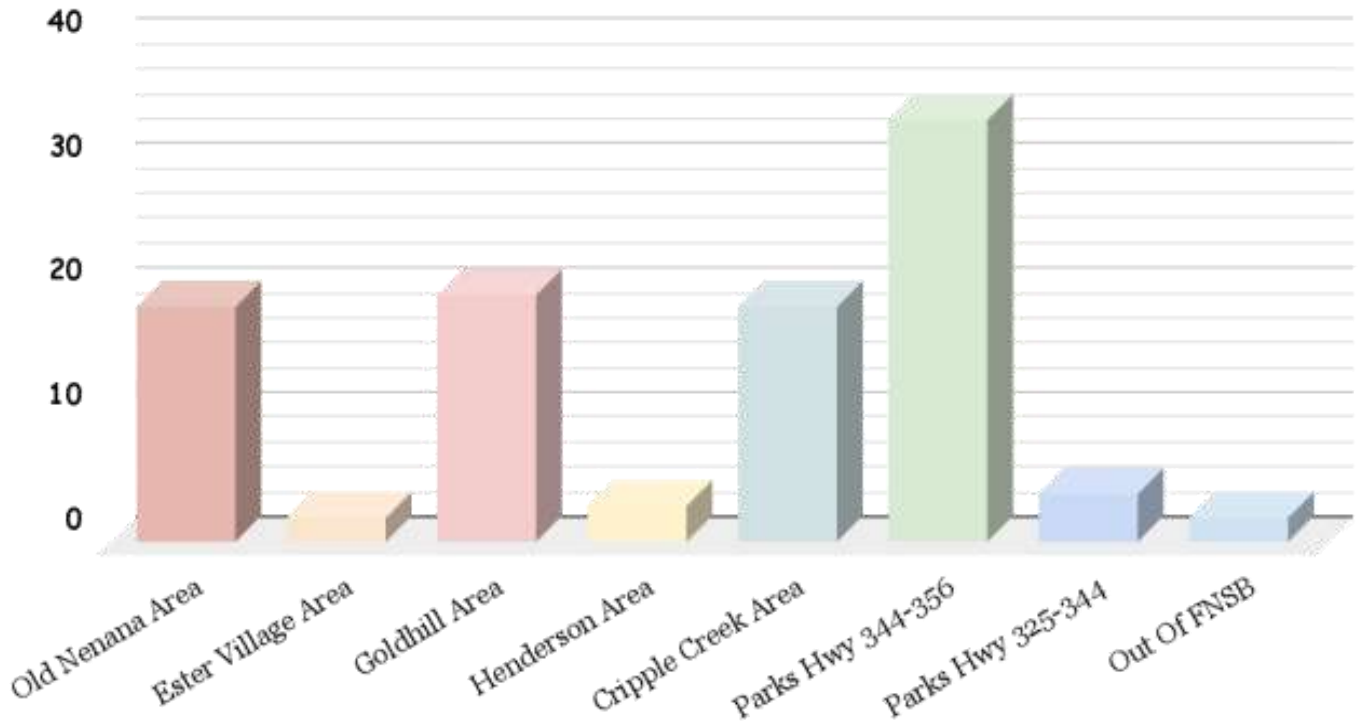

Training

The Ester Volunteer Fire Department trains at a minimum of 3 hours a week on Tuesday Nights from 6:30 – 9:30 pm. Trainings happen in person at the station, off site with mutual aid departments, and online. This year, EVFD hosted 2 statewide National Fire Administration trainings at Station 51.





Goals for the Future

Trail EMS

Krystel Marino and Greg Kahoe are the new leads for the Trail EMS program. We have been awarded grant funds through the Code Blue Program to purchase a second UTV to complement our current trail fleet of 3 snowmachines, a snowbulance and UTV. This program will allow us to render aid to patients in known locations throughout the extensive FNSB trail system.

Annexation

We will be pursuing incorporating the Parks Highway Corridor into our Fire Service Area.

Water Supply

We are planning to increase our remote water capability by adding a similar site at Deraco/Old Ridge Trail as we currently have at Oboe Court. The Deraco site will increase our water access to a total of 20,000 gallons of fire fighting water.

Solarization

We are continuing to pursue funding to add solar panels to our station.

Grant Program

Admin Mimi Hill will continue her robust grant program by searching out new sources of funding to bolster our budget.

Fire Apparatus

While our fleet is aging, it is very well maintained. This year, we are refurbishing Engine 51 to bring it up to current safety standards. Over the next several years, we will be looking into replacing the 1993 brush truck and the 1999 tender.
